




The Dartmouth Phalanx

- Organized in 1834 (military duty was briefly made compulsory for New Hampshire youths over 18)
- First & most famous of the student military companies
- Thrived for 11 years, establishing
 Dartmouth's proud military tradition




Letters of Daniel E. Bouttelle ('62)



- Wrote letters to his brother from Hanover in the opening days of the Civil War
- Describes a campus rapt with excitement and eagerness

"The only objects in view at present are the preservation of our Union and the defense of our honor."

The Dartmouth Cavaliers




- Company of cavalrymen organized by Sanford S. Burr '63
- Included 35 students from Dartmouth,
 23 from Norwich University, 4 from
 Bowdoin and a few from Amherst,
 Williams, Union
- Saw action on the battlefield during a 3-month stint in the war

Resignation of President Lord

- Served as President of Dartmouth for 35 years
- Held an ultraconservative Biblical interpretation of slavery
- Dartmouth had an "unearned national reputation for being pro-slavery"
- Resigned in 1863 in the wake of criticism from the Board of Trustees

Civil War Memorial in Rauner

- Given in 1913 by the Class of 1863 as a 50th reunion present to the College
- Lists the names, ranks, and military units of the 56 classmates who served in the Civil War
- 53 served for the Union, and 3 for the Confederacy



"Dispatches from the Civil War"

- Featured in the Dartmouth Alumni Magazine (2013)
- "No college had a larger proportion of her men enrolled in the armed forces" (652 student volunteers)
- Details the individual experiences of Dartmouth alumni during the Civil War
