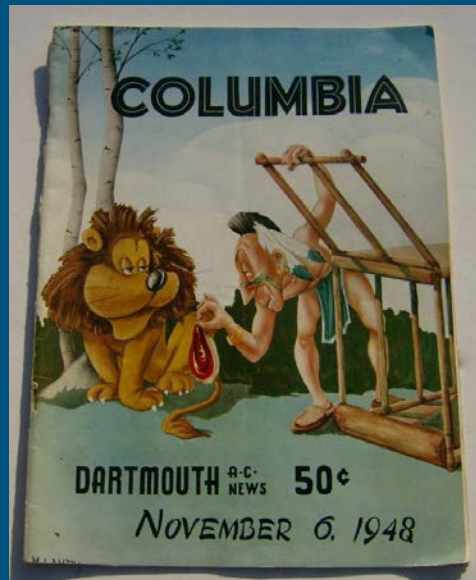
In 1978, a modest quarterback named Eugene "Buddy" Teevens took Dartmouth to its first Ivy League title since 1973 with an uncanny passing ability. The usually Teevens didn't let limited experience hold him back -- in second and on unprecedented 10th title, seventh outing.

In the process, the co-captain wrote the record book. He completed 117 passes during the fall to break Mike Boal's record of 90 set in 1975. He also surpassed Jack Kindred's 1960 standard of 172 attempts with 184.

The last goes on -- Teevens holds the Ivy mark for completion percentage (58.8), yards per attempt (10.1) as well as career completion percentage (58.8), despite the fact that Teevens of Columbia is one of the best at 57.

A talented hockey player and player on Dartmouth's 1979 Ivy League Championship team that went on to finish third in the NCAA Championship, Teevens was a first team All-Ivy football selection and recipient of the Bushnell Trophy as the conference's outstanding player.

Mascot/Nickname

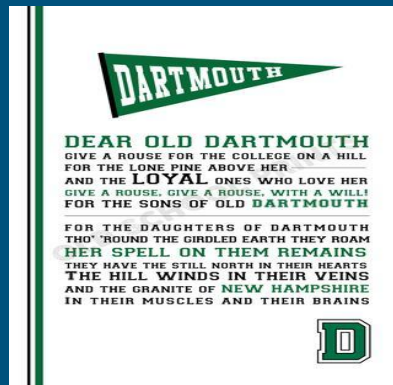


- Dartmouth first unofficial mascot was “The Indian”, but was dismissed in 1970s

Football Song Verse Composed at Game By Dartmouth Man

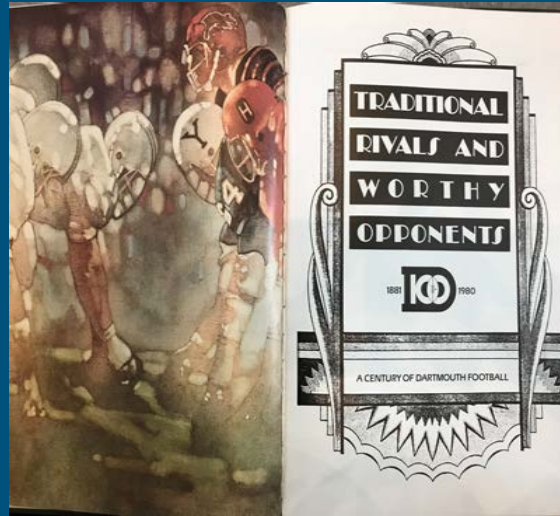
New words to the College football song, "As the Backs Go Tearing By," were written by an enthusiastic Dartmouth rooter in the stands of Palmer Stadium at Princeton on Saturday afternoon.

Myron B. Ball, of Springfield, Massachusetts, composed the new verse as the Indians surged ahead during the second half of the game. The words, appropriate to the Ivy League championship won by the Big Green, are:

*As the backs went tearing by,
They sure made old Princeton cry,
Showed the Tigers' single wing
Blackman's V was just the thing,
As the backs went tearing by;
Then they walloped Old Nassau
Like their line was made of straw,
Now when Dartmouth's back in town
They will wear the Ivy Crown
As the backs go tearing by.*

Ivy League Competition

- First "Ivy Group Agreement" signed in 1945 focused on football
- Ivy League formed in 1954
- Dartmouth continued to play its Ivy League counterparts
- First Ivy League Championship 1958
- 18x Ivy League Champion



Competition Then:

- Dartmouth National Championship in 1925
- Dartmouth used to play currently major D1 FBS schools like Georgia, Notre Dame etc.
- Dartmouth used to play on major national scale.

Competition Now:

- Dartmouth now plays reduced 10 game schedule
- Only plays Ivy League schools and D1 FCS teams
- Continues to play rivals, Holy Cross and UNH

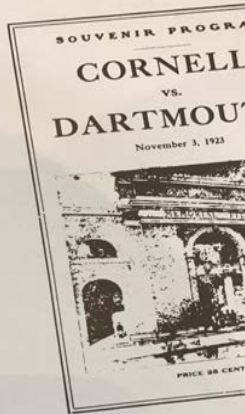
Dartmouth Marches Through Georgia -For its 200th Win!

1921 — Dartmouth 7, Georgia 0

Dartmouth used what one reporter called "the most brilliantly executed aerial display ever seen on a Dixie gridiron" to march through Georgia, 7-0. It was the first major Northern football victory on Southern soil.

The sole touchdown of the game came in the closing moments of the first half, when the injured Jim Robertson lofted a pass that travelled more than 50 yards in the air into the waiting arms of Ed Lynch, who coasted into the endzone.

Dartmouth's 200th football victory it was, a low-scoring game packed full of drama. The win was powered with three engines: Pudge Neidlinger, who added the extra point; Charles Calder, who gained 88 of Dartmouth's 275 total yards; and Robertson, whose performance on defense was so spectacular that the president of Georgia's State Senate remarked: "If that man is crippled now, I hope he never plays Georgia again when he's well."
