Kira: I'm here with Lia Constantine. She is of Greek Origin, and growing up, she practiced a lot

of superstitions. So Lia, what can you tell me about the evil eye?

Lia: So the evil eye I think is like something in my family from what my parents and

grandparents have told me is that as soon as a baby is born, they are at risk for having evil spirits.

So you can either pin an evil eye to their bassinet or their blanket or you can pin a picture of a

saint to babies. So ever since then, many of the gifts I have received from my grandparents have
